Pastor's Column

What is lost does become precious, doesn't it? So many simple joys—sitting down with you for a brief chat when you arrive for church. The joy of coffee and conversation after the service. The joy of looking you in the eye as I say, "The body of Christ, broken for you." The joy of worshiping together. The joy of singing together! And so much else in our lives that made up our daily

and weekly routines which is not available to us at this time. We look back longingly at the life we once had and all that we took for granted.

The reality is that we do not have a date yet for resuming worship indoors. But this is not a time for mourning. Friends, we were born in Christ for such a time as this! We find our signpost in Revelation 21:5:

And he who was seated on the throne said, "Behold, I am making all things new."

Making all things new: Since mid-March we have been constantly re-inventing our understanding of what it means to be church together. Immediately we moved our worship online, which we plan to continue indefinitely. It's all right there on the home page of our web site, holytrinitymarshall.com. You can either subscribe from there to our YouTube channel to be notified whenever new videos are posted, or simply click on the link on the home page (or the photo). We also post that link every week on our Facebook page.

We also quickly began expanding our web site and adding many new features. For awhile I sent out regular congregational updates by email, and then wrote a series of daily devotions for several weeks to bridge the time until we launched the Sunday morning outdoor service on June 14. Those are still posted on our web site under "A Room With a View." In June the Council began meeting on the parsonage deck, and the Pastor's Coffee Hour has resumed in-person at Paradiddle's Café outdoors on their patio. As your pastor I recommend we be even more vigilant about wearing face coverings in all these contexts.

As we are learning more now about how the virus can spread through aerosols in enclosed areas, we are recognizing the wisdom of delaying initial plans to move worship back into the building. The Council had set a tentative date of August 23 to re-gather, but that may be premature. Other ELCA congregations in our area that had planned to be back inside by this time have delayed their plans as well. Your Council is extremely conscientious and is constantly evaluating local and regional data. Their foremost concern is for your well-being.

In the meantime, we have determined that it is safe for small groups to meet outside as long as safe distances are maintained. Please consider participating in some of these ways as a means of renewing our lives together. These opportunities invite us to get to know one other better so that, when we do come back into the building, we will have been "woven together" in entirely new ways. Stronger together, we will be able to more vigorously serve our community and region as Jesus is calling us to do.

Small group activities include:

- the Pastor's Coffee Hour at Paradiddle's every Thursday at noon
- Campfire Conversations outside at the parsonage every third Wednesday from 7-8 pm
- A three-part study on the book "White Fragility" at the parsonage <u>on three successive</u> <u>Monday evenings</u> – July 27, August 3, and August 10, 6:30 pm
 - A weekly Bible study every Monday at 10 am via Zoom starting July 13

Please send me an email or text, or call the office, if you'd like to be part of the book or Bible study. Our WELCA group has also resumed monthly meetings, outside, on 2nd Tuesdays at 1 pm. Contact me about ideas you might have. All are welcome!

Pastor Raabe can be available to meet anyone on an individual basis. Just call her or text to set up a time.

DRIVE-IN/OUTDOOR WORSHIP EVERY SUNDAY AT 10 AM

We warmly invite you to gather in your cars, or on our beautiful lawn, for outdoor worship every Sunday at 10 am. You may remain in your cars (it's OK to have the engine and AC running) or spread out on the grass in the cool morning shade. For those with nimble legs, the top of the hill is an



ideal spot for lawn chairs and families with younger children. Bulletins and pre-packaged communion are handed out as you arrive, and bathroom access is available. Let's take advantage of these lovely summer days to come together in this way. The comment was heard on June 28: "It's good to be back at church again!"

Hearty thanks to all who are making this possible, including our parking lot ushers, musicians, and various other heavy lifters. Very special thanks to Dave Pawl for loaning us his own PA equipment for our first outing, advising us on the purchase of our own (using Memorial Fund money), and training us to do the PA setup ourselves. We welcome anyone who would like to serve as an usher, reader, musician, or participate in the service in any way.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION UPDATE We are seeking a new Sunday School Superintendent, or maybe co-superintendents, as Laurie Weisensel has asked to step down from that position after many years of faithful service. We thank Laurie most sincerely for all she has done for our program, for loving our children so well, for putting the song of Jesus into their hearts, and for supervising the curriculum and teachers.

The challenges of our education programs are the same as those schools are facing—discerning how to keep our children and teachers safe while providing them with a solid foundation of learning for their lives of faith. Please prayerfully consider being part of this adventure. We also plan to convene a Christian Education team that would work closely with the superintendent(s). Let Pastor Raabe or any Council member know if you feel God calling you in this way.

Registration for Sunday School and Confirmation will begin in August. We WILL have these programs—we just don't know yet what they will look like. Stay tuned and share your thoughts.

HOLY TRINITY TASK FORCE FOR RE-GATHERING: JULY UPDATE The Task Force for Regathering—Wendy Franke, chair, Sandi Brewer, Maria Johnson, Kathy Deneen, and Pastor Raabe – has put together a preliminary list of suggested guidelines for reopening the building. *This is only a draft* and will be scrutinized closely by the Council in coming weeks.

Signage: All approved guidelines and cleaning practices will be posted in multiple locations. **Face coverings**: Must be worn at all times for indoor worship and other activities in the building; may be removed only when receiving communion. Those who don't bring their own will be given one upon arrival.

Hand sanitizer stations will be placed throughout the narthex, sanctuary, and fellowship hall. **Ushers**: Four will be needed for each service to guide worshipers entering and leaving, and to encourage them to refrain from congregating indoors. People may visit once they've left the building although face masks will still be recommended. We will be recruiting usher teams starting next month and will begin usher training when we have a better idea of when we will be back inside.

Seating: People may choose a general area, but an usher will guide them to a safely spaced location within that area. The front two rows will be kept vacant; all worship will be led from the altar area.

Communion: Worshipers will receive pre-packaged communion upon arrival, until such a time as it's judged safe to resume distribution (using gloves) of bread and individual cups of wine.
Attendance: We would like to know who is present at each service. All worshipers will check in with someone seated at the Welcome Desk before moving into the sanctuary.
During worship: Difficult as it will be, no singing or praying aloud. We may have a single vocalist or instrumentalist at times, who will be mic'd to reduce the spreading of aerosols.
Cleaning and sanitizing: A special crew including Task Force members will oversee this significant job, closely following CDC guidelines, so the assurance can be given before each service that "the entire church has been cleaned and sanitized." Cleaning methods will include a non-toxic ionized spray and thorough sanitizing of all surfaces and bathrooms. Details of what is to be cleaned, how, and with what products will be posted. All high-touch surfaces will be removed (tables, chairs, coffee bar) or be placed off limits (drinking fountains).
Signups: No clipboard or bulletin board signups; these will be conducted online or by phone.
Fresh air: Doors will be kept open as much as possible for good ventilation.

Issues still to be considered include: Whether to limit the number of people in a service; whether to add services as needed, possibly at other times during the week; and if the number is limited, how to sign up ahead of time or call the church to "make a reservation."

Thanks to the Task Force for its commitment to this very important work.

NEW GARAGE/BAKE SALE DATES: SEPTEMBER 17-19, 2020

These are the new selected dates: Garage sale <u>preparation</u> dates will be Mon, Sept 14-Wed, Sept 16. <u>The dates for the garage and bake sale will be Thurs.</u>, Sept 17-Sat., Sept 19. We were pleased with the response last year to the brat sale that happened during the lunch hour in our church's parking lot on each day of our sale. Perhaps we can offer that added attraction again this year. Watch for more information on this in coming weeks.

Some early planning for the garage and bake sale has already happened. Thank you to those who have offered suggestions and have committed to helping with organizing this event. We will continue to accept garage sale donations at the main entrance of the church on Thursday and Saturday between the hours of 10 AM and 12 noon. If you cannot drop off the items then, leave a phone message at church, 655-4246, or call Linda Baldridge, 655-4178. **Do NOT leave donation**

items outside the church. We are accepting gently used and clean items in good condition. Small furniture and other household items are very popular. Please note that we cannot accept VCR tapes, TVs, entertainment centers, mattresses or box springs, sofa sleepers and reclining sofas, futons, exercise equipment, baby items (such as car seats, cribs and walkers), large appliances, items that are prohibitively large and heavy to handle (such as large furniture items), and hazardous or construction materials. If you have large items to donate or you are not able to make donations during the times listed above, you can arrange a time for drop off by calling the numbers above.

The Council, Task Force for Re-gathering and your Garage Sale Team will be creating safe guidelines by which the sale can take place and sharing those with you in the coming weeks.
