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## WHAT'S ON TAP FOR HOLY WEEK AND EASTER?

We are glad you asked!

### March 28, Palm/Passion Sunday

- The **online service** features a dramatic reading of the Passion story from Mark with a full cast of characters.

- The **drive-in service** at 10 a.m. starts off with a grand palm procession around the parking lot led by Jasper the donkey. Palms will be handed out as you arrive; wear your good walking shoes and join us in a jaunt around the lot as we sing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" before returning to our cars. The service also includes a re-telling of the Passion from Mark's gospel with three readers accompanied dramatically by percussion. Don't miss out on this festive worship experience.



### Maundy Thursday, April 1, 7 p.m.

- In-person worship in the sanctuary; a beautiful service with contemplative music and a confession based on the 10 Commandments;



photos projected on the wall of our confirmands serving as "helping hands" at home or in the community; our first experience of Holy Communion in more than a year with real bread and wine; concludes with the stripping of the altar in preparation for Good Friday as Psalm 22 is sung.



## Good Friday, April 2

Online only: We'll share a Tenebrae service characterized by the gradual extinguishing of candles as the Passion narrative from John's Gospel is read, interspersed with stanzas from powerful Lenten hymns. The service ends in darkness as we ponder the death of Christ on the cross.

## Easter Sunday, April 4

- 7 a.m.: Sunrise worship with communion in the parking lot. Our last drive-in service!
- 9 and 11 a.m.: In-person worship in the sanctuary with festive hymns. Registration is required—call the church or email Pastor Raabe with the number in your party, [pastor@holytrinity-marshall.com](mailto:pastor@holytrinity-marshall.com).
- 10 a.m.: Really big Easter egg hunt! Kids of all ages are welcome. Bring your own baskets; we'll provide bags for all the candy you will be taking home.



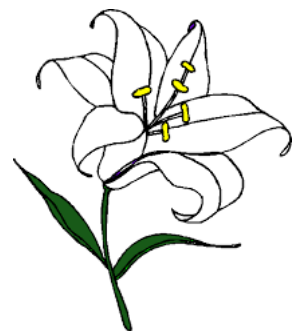
Let's walk through this climactic week together as the community of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church!



### Pastor's Column: THIS JOYFUL EASTERTIDE

"Had Christ, who once was slain, not burst his three-day prison," we sing in the exuberant Easter hymn of this name (ELW 391), "our faith had been in vain. But now has Christ arisen, arisen, arisen, ari-----sen!"

We will meet this hymn on Easter Sunday. George Woodward's text comes from 1 Corinthians 15, Paul's great "Resurrection" chapter. In 15:14 Paul lays it on the line to the church in Corinth: "And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith." Without Jesus' death and resurrection, without Good Friday and Easter, he would have been just another prophet. But the Resurrection is real. It really, truly happened. It is even mentioned as having taken place by Josephus, a Roman historian writing in the late first century AD.



This is news—this is good news! It was good news then and it still is today. And news needs to be told!

Jesus was not resuscitated, in the manner of Lazarus in John 11, who was brought back to life but who (we presume) eventually died. That is, following his resurrection Jesus did not resume a life in which he was still subject to death. He had *transcended* death. He was no longer subject to its power. Paul

testifies in Romans 6:9, “We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him.”

As one theologian has written, humanity’s clear “no” to God in its sin is returned with God’s “yes” to all creation. Even with all our waywardness, our obstinacy—even so, Jesus is risen! And not because anything that we have done...in fact, the opposite. We keep doing things that show us to be unworthy of such a gift. But this is the truth of grace: God’s grace keeps coming at us anyway because God loves us that much. What wondrous love is this, O my soul!

This is the good news of the Christian gospel, and it is good news *for us*. God has redeemed us, we who once were lost! Think of the redemption counter at an arcade where you trade your tickets in for prizes. God has bought us back with the death of his Son, but has taken the process one cosmic step further in Christ’s victory over death. The Resurrection enables Jesus to be with us in a way that only faith can understand, and at the same time it shatters the power of all those earthly obstacles that try to separate us from God, the biggest of which is our own shame—the idea that we are unworthy. You ARE worthy—God loves you that much! There is a five-letter word that sums this up: G-R-A-C-E. Whatever you are going through, cling to God’s grace with all your heart and soul and strength.

On our own, this prescription can simply be too hard to fill. This is where the church comes in. The church is the body of Christ in the world. Just as you need your physical body to experience life on earth, you need Christ’s body as the church to know life in Christ. Through the church faith is nurtured and strengthened. Through the church the good news of forgiveness, salvation, and eternal life are proclaimed. Through the church, members of the body of Christ are equipped to become the *means* of grace, agents of salvation for others. Through our liturgy and song, through our preaching and teaching, through the words we speak and the works of our hands that arise from our faith, the Christian gospel is spread in our families, through our towns, across the nation, and around the world. This is how God’s kingdom breaks in.

So why do we bother with Holy Week? Why not just jump straight to Easter and forget about all that sad stuff?

Because in the Christian story there is no resurrection without death. And Christ’s death needed to be a certain kind of death: It had to be a humiliation deep enough to encompass all the forms of suffering that humans must endure in a world where people purposely inflict pain on others.

Here is the key to that understanding: *The crucified Christ is the defining revelation both of God and of the human condition.* God loves the world, but the world, still ruled by Satan, is full of pain. The ego and its hunger for accomplishments tries to get us to ignore our pain. But it was *on the cross* that God chose to reveal God’s self fully to us—hidden in the form the one despised and rejected by the world, the one who suffered just as we do so that we may come to know this crucified God in our own suffering.



What kind of God is revealed on the cross? A God who loves us so much that he was willing to enter into a world of pain and suffer the worst of what human beings can do to each other, so that he can be with us in the worst that we must endure; a God who, in life's darkest moments, tells us that death is not the end and that the promise of eternal life is real; a God whose victory over death is an actual, actual sign that this promise is true; a God whose power is revealed in weakness, one whose death brings life through death. Here on the cross, only faith is able to recognize God in the crucified Christ. Here on the cross, as Martin Luther wrote, we see Christ as the very mirror of the Father's heart.

Therefore I encourage you to enter fully into the Easter story this year. Don't take a shortcut to Easter Sunday. Share in the grand procession of palms on March 28 that greets Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, and grasp—in the same service—the truth of what awaits Jesus at the end of that "Via Dolorosa." Participate in the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday as we remember Jesus' own Last Supper and the commitment to love and acts of service he showed the disciples, knowing all that was coming the next day. Experience the reality of Jesus' death on the cross on Good Friday through powerful hymns and a service that concludes in darkness. Awake on Sunday and be astonished, once again, by the earth-shattering news of Easter. Let it make headlines in your life, and then go and share this good news.

An endowment gift helps move us into a more sustainable position.

You could also choose to designate a portion of the proceeds of your IRA to Holy Trinity each year. We have been very grateful to members who have chosen this option as a way to make a sizable annual gift. Another way to help Holy Trinity is to name the church as the beneficiary of your life insurance policy. This could convey assets in larger amounts without disrupting your current cash flow. ## REST

*<sup>31</sup>Jesus said to them, 'Come away with me. Let us go alone to a quiet place and rest for a while.' Many people were coming and going. They could not even eat. <sup>32</sup>So they went away in a boat to a lonely place by themselves. <sup>33</sup>The people saw them going. Many people knew them. The people ran from all the towns and got there ahead of them. (Mark 6:31-33)*

In Mark's Gospel things happen quickly. By the beginning of Chapter 6 Jesus has taught far and wide, casting out demons and stilling storms. The pace is hectic and crowds are following him everywhere. Then he and the disciples receive the shattering news that John the Baptist has been beheaded. They gather his body, carefully place it in a tomb and regather around Jesus, nervous and on edge. But people won't leave them alone. Mark's Gospel tells us, "Many people were coming and going. They could not even eat."

So Jesus says to them, Mark 6:31-32: "Come away with me. Let us go alone to a quiet place and rest for a while."

"Rest for a while." This is not an invitation, but a command. In fact, it is one of the 10 Commandments. But how often do we listen?

We Americans not only love to work, but we are accustomed to pushing ourselves beyond our limits. I believe the typical American work schedule, at least pre-pandemic, is part of the reason we have become such a secular culture. Leave home at 7, get to work at 8, break for lunch for an hour, work until 5, get home at 6, collapse on the couch, eat dinner, watch TV and go to bed. Where is there time to hear God's voice in the midst of that?

Lack of adequate rest can ruin families, damage souls, even kill us. When we push ourselves like that we can lose sight of what we enjoy in our work, we find that things we used to love doing have become a chore, we fail to be fully present for others, and we lose our ability to hear God speaking to us.



Human beings were not made to work 24/7. How do we know that? Because God created us in God's own image, and we know from the great act of creation that God is one who works and then rests.

What if we were to think of every day of life that God gives us as a great act of creation? How can we build into each day rhythms of rest alongside those of work in a way that frees us to hear God's voice?

Here is an idea. What if we were to sprinkle "God pauses" throughout our day? A few minutes here and there to pause, remember your breath, center yourself in the cosmos, and give yourself over into God's hands. Or instead of an hour for lunch, trim that to half an hour and take two 15-minute breaks in the morning and afternoon to put yourself in the midst of nature, even if it's just gazing out a

window, and think of how your molecules and atoms are the same as those shared by all living creatures. Remember, in the words of Joni Mitchell, that we are stardust!

Taking frequent God pauses throughout the day has been my Lenten discipline this year. Each time I find that I'm able to resume work with greater energy and clarity.

And how did it go for the disciples in Mark 6? Let's hear the passage again:

<sup>31</sup> "Jesus said to them, 'Come away with me. Let us go alone to a quiet place and rest for a while.' Many people were coming and going. They could not even eat.

<sup>32</sup> "So they went away in a boat to a lonely place by themselves."

BUT....

<sup>33</sup> "The people saw them going. Many people knew them. The people ran from all the towns and got there ahead of them."

They were going to need all the God pauses they could get! Let us pray:

*<sup>1</sup>For God alone my soul waits in silence;  
from him comes my salvation.*

*<sup>2</sup>He alone is my rock and my salvation,  
my fortress; I shall never be shaken.*

(Psalm 62:1-2)

### **Council Highlights, March 9**

We have a new Girl Scout troop meeting at church on the first Thursday evening of each month. They will get involved in service projects, and will host a Girl Scout Cookie sale at the church on Palm Sunday. Susy Pawl has plans ready for Sunday School opening on April 11. A motion was approved to allow Sunday School to resume inside.

COVID-19: There is an uptick in Madison numbers probably due to the UW students. Without students, the numbers in WI are very good and support our re-opening plans.

A motion was approved to move the money in our Endowment Fund into a managed growth fund, since as cash it is currently accumulating very little interest. We anticipate this will allow it to grow at a rate of about 5% annually.

The Endowment Investment Team and the Bylaws Committee will meet to discuss how the interest from the fund should be used. It is recommended that the principal should not be touched without agreement from both committees.

Wendy Franke presented recommendations for inside worship from the task force. Twenty to 40 can be seated at each service. Dan Timpel agreed to head up the organization of ushers.
